There is no power to be a ruler, own wealth, or acquire occult powers.

jor na suratee giaan veechaar ||

There is no power in acquiring knowledge and having dialogues on spiritual scriptures.

jor na jugatee chhu Tai sa
(n)saar \parallel

There is no power in knowing the ways to attain salvation.

jis hath jor kar vekhai soi ||

The one holding the power is the one who practices self-reflection.

naanak utam neech na koi ||33||

Nanak says the one who does not judge anyone as superior or inferior is powerful. (33)

Essence: Guru Nanak states that contemplation and self-actualization are the most powerful attributes, transcending the duality of superiority and inferiority.

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
