The omnipresent energy resides in one's consciousness, why search for it in the jungle? Symbolizing the futility of outer wandering without inner awakening. (19)

Essence: Sheikh Farid redirects the spiritual seeker from illusion to awareness. The symbolism of wandering from one forest to another is to navigate the diverse thoughts of the mind, and the thorns symbolize ego and duality. He emphasizes that enlightenment does not lie in ritualistic self-denial. Instead, it invites us to sit with ourselves, to confront our thoughts and recognize the ever-present awareness within us that permeates all life.

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
