They are the only ones in our society who can be called the high caste, the superior. (4)(7)

Essence: Bhagat Kabir challenges the deeply rooted illusion of social and religious hierarchy. He confronts the idea of superiority based on birth, reminding us that all beings come from the same source. Regardless of family background or social standing, we all share the same physical form and are born in the same way, through our mother's womb, delivered through the birth canal. This shared origin makes the concept of ancestral purity or inherited superiority meaningless. Our true essence transcends identity, raising questions: if we are all born through the same biological process, what makes one birth more sacred than another? What truly defines superiority in the social or religious domain? Those who understand and live by the truth of our unity in diversity are the ones who deserve this recognition and status. Bhagat Kabir warns of letting intellectual arrogance or religious pride dictate our identity clouds our self-awareness as it wastes the precious gift of life.
