Essence: Sheikh Farid emphasizes that a stubborn mind is unresponsive like a body in a grave. This refusal to evolve leads to an inner lifelessness, devoid of learning, compassion, and growth. We may continue to encounter valuable insights, but if we block them from being absorbed, something essential inside becomes stagnant. This mindset values ego over authenticity, diminishing the ability to be truly alive. In contrast, a receptive mind remains alive through understanding.

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
